## **Budget Message**

Thank you for the continuous support towards East County Fire and Rescue (ECFR). We provide fire, rescue, and partner with Camas Washougal Fire Department for emergency medical services, serving around 10,426 residents over 60 square miles. ECFR has a balanced budget, no debt, clean audit records, and in 2023 received an improved bond rating of AA- from Standard and Poor's, showcasing our financial responsibility.

The 2024 adopted budget brings notable changes to improve clarity and alignment with our Integrated Comprehensive Plan (ICP), adopting the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) best practices. This makes the budget a clearer policy, operational, financial, and communication tool, meeting the GFOA Distinguished Budget Presentation Award Program requirements.

In 2023, ECFR achieved significant progress by becoming debt free for the first time since 2006, revising the district's strategic plan, and developing long-term financial and capital projects plans to ensure cost-effective services and timely replacement of resources. In addition, the district secured a grant of \$254,337 from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for health and safety and training improvements. Operationally, we added one full-time firefighter, increased volunteer staff from four to sixteen, and propose adding another full-time firefighter in 2024 to reduce overtime expenses and five additional volunteer personnel to augment full-and part-time staffing.

However, challenges remain due to limited property tax revenue, high staff turnover, overtime costs for essential staffing, and an aging fleet that needs replacement. While the district improved its fiscal position through increased reserves and early debt payoff, projected negative cash flow in 2024 prompts a key decision – seek voter approval for an increase in property tax levy to maintain or enhance service levels beyond 2025 or reduce services to match the limited revenue. Your support is crucial in helping ECFR continue its mission to protect our community.

## **East County Fire and Rescue**

East County Fire and Rescue (ECFR) operates as a legally organized fire protection district under the *Revised Code of Washington (RCW) Title 52* and is governed by a five-member board of fire commissioners, each serving a six-year term. The board establishes policy and provides direction to the fire chief who is responsible for the day-to-day operations and fiscal management of the district. As a fire protection district, ECFR is a municipal corporation that is independent from Clark County.



#### **Service Area**

East County Fire and Rescue (ECFR) serves an area of 60 square miles and a population of approximately 10,426. ECFR's response area is in the southeast corner of Clark County, east of Vancouver and north and east of Camas and Washougal.

#### **Services Provided**

East County Fire and Rescue is an all-hazards service providing fire protection, emergency medical services, hazardous materials response, and rescue services. In addition, the district has established prevention at the core of our service to the community.



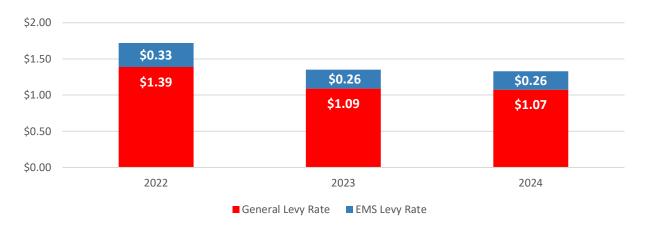
#### Revenue

In 2024, 98.71% of the district's \$3,784,134 in revenue will come from property taxes, 79.65% from the general levy and 19.06% from the emergency medical services (EMS) levy.

#### **Property Taxes**

The *Washington State Constitution* and related laws strictly limit the amount of property tax that local taxing districts can levy. There are two important property tax limitations for fire districts. Annual increases in property taxes levied to 1%, plus revenue from new construction and fire districts are limited to a maximum regular property tax rate of \$1.50/1,000 of Assessed Value (AV).



#### **Other Revenues**

Other revenues include fees for service, grants, sale of surplus real or personal property, etc. In some cases, these are one-time revenues and in other cases they are ongoing but comprise a small proportion of the district's total revenue.

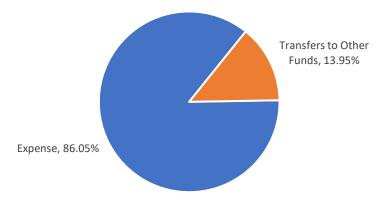
#### **Expenditures**

ECFR budget is divided into multiple funds, each with a specific purpose. In 2023 the district's budget is \$4,054,758 inclusive of both operating expenditures (general and grants management funds), capital projects (capital projects and grants management fund), expenses for advanced life support ambulance service (emergency medical services fund).

#### **General Fund**

The general fund is the district's principal operating fund. This fund accounts for all current expenditures (e.g., personal services and materials and services) not specifically accounted for in other funds as well as transfers to other funds. As all revenue with the exception of grants is deposited in the general fund, other funds such as the capital projects fund and leave accrual fund are funded through transfers from the general fund. ECFR's general fund budget for 2024 is \$3,612,604with 86.05.00% allocated t

o general fund expenses and 13.95.01% transferred to other funds.



#### **Capital Projects Fund**

Capital assets are items having a cost greater than \$5,000 and a service life of greater than one year (e.g., major equipment, fire apparatus, and fire stations). Effective capital planning makes sure key assets are repaired or replaced before their end of service life or critical failure. In addition, a sound capital projects plan allows us to engage our community in understanding the costs and benefits of maintaining capital infrastructure. The district has no capital projects budgeted for 2024 but will order a new fire engine to replace one that has reached its end of useful life with anticipated delivery in 2025.

#### **Leave Accrual Fund**

The leave accrual fund is used to manage the district's liability for payout to employees for unused vacation upon retirement or other separation from employment. The district anticipates one retirement at the end of 2023 with payout for unused leave in 2024.

#### **Emergency Medical Services Fund**

Revenue for the emergency medical services fund is generated by the EMS levy and this fund serves as a pass through with all revenue transferred to the City of Camas for provision of advanced life support emergency medical services in East County Fire and Rescue's service area.
